Florida Picnic—Last Reminder

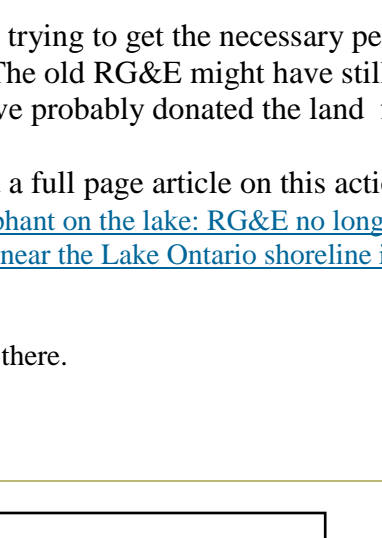
This is your last reminder until next year! The Picnic is March 7, 2011 !

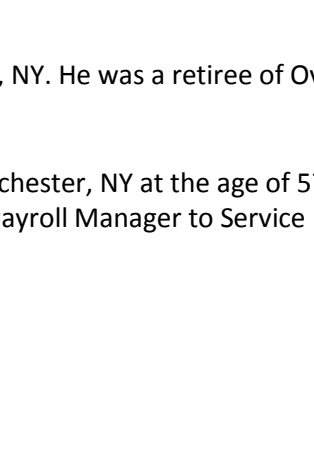
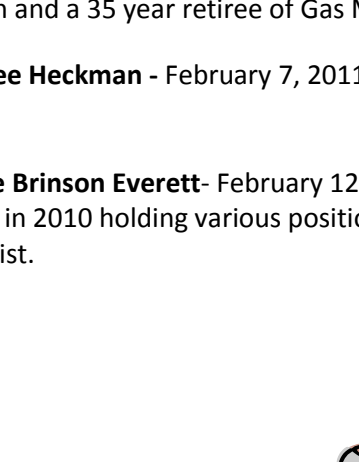

I have not received a report for anyone attending if the location proved acceptable. But on the other hand, I did not get a new location for their March 9, 2011 meeting.



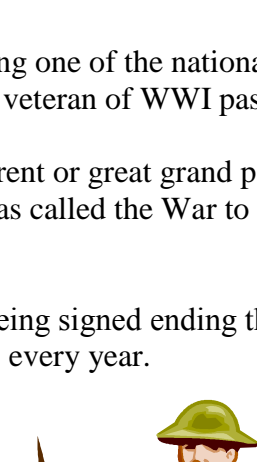
Obituary Page

Gary Lee Heckman - February 7, 2011, Penfield, NY. He was a retiree of Overhead C&M.

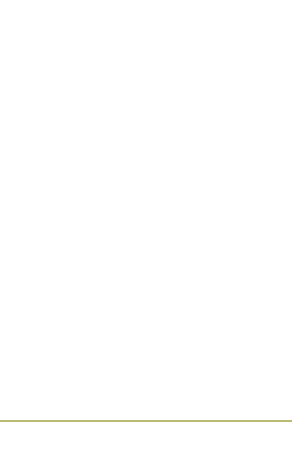
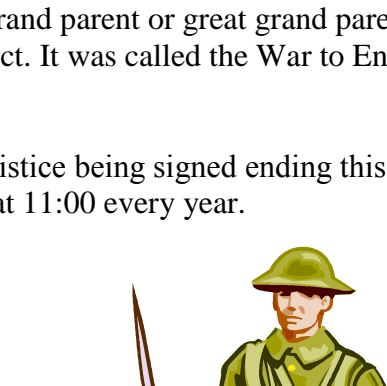

- March 20th**—First Day of Spring ('Bout Time)

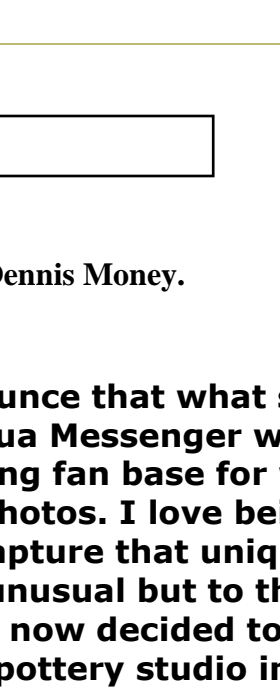


The End of an Era

Most of us have a grand parent or great grand parent whose lives were affected by this global conflict. It was called the War to End All Wars, unfortunately it wasn't.

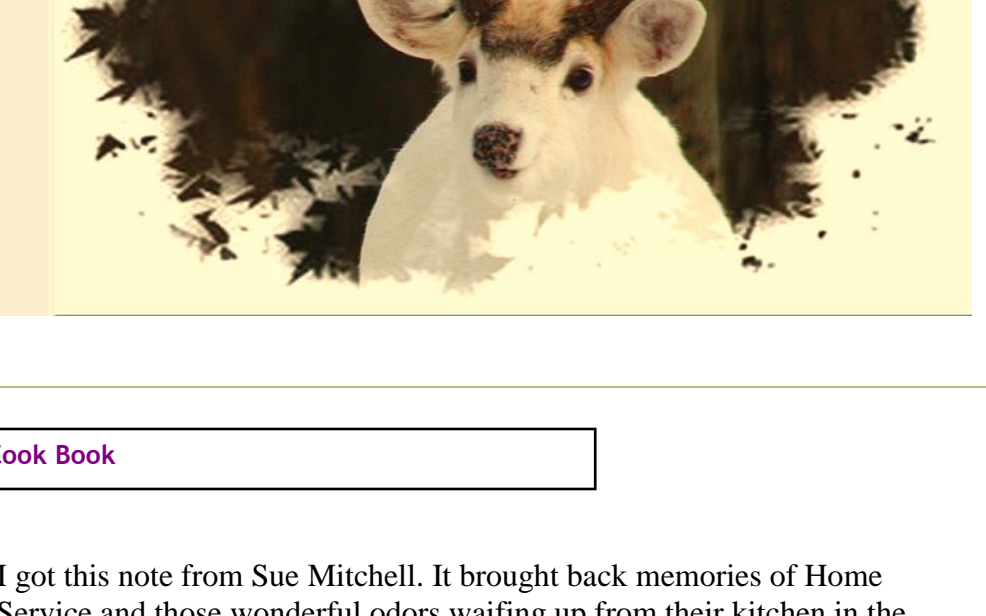
Because of the Armistice being signed ending this conflict, we "Remember" on November 11th at 11:00 every year.

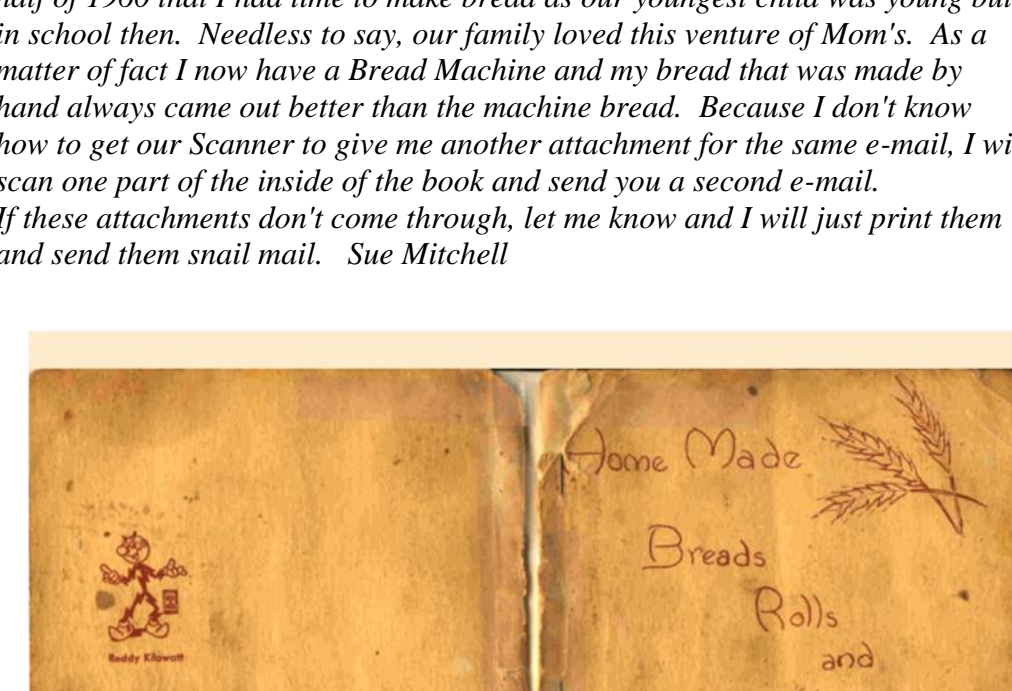

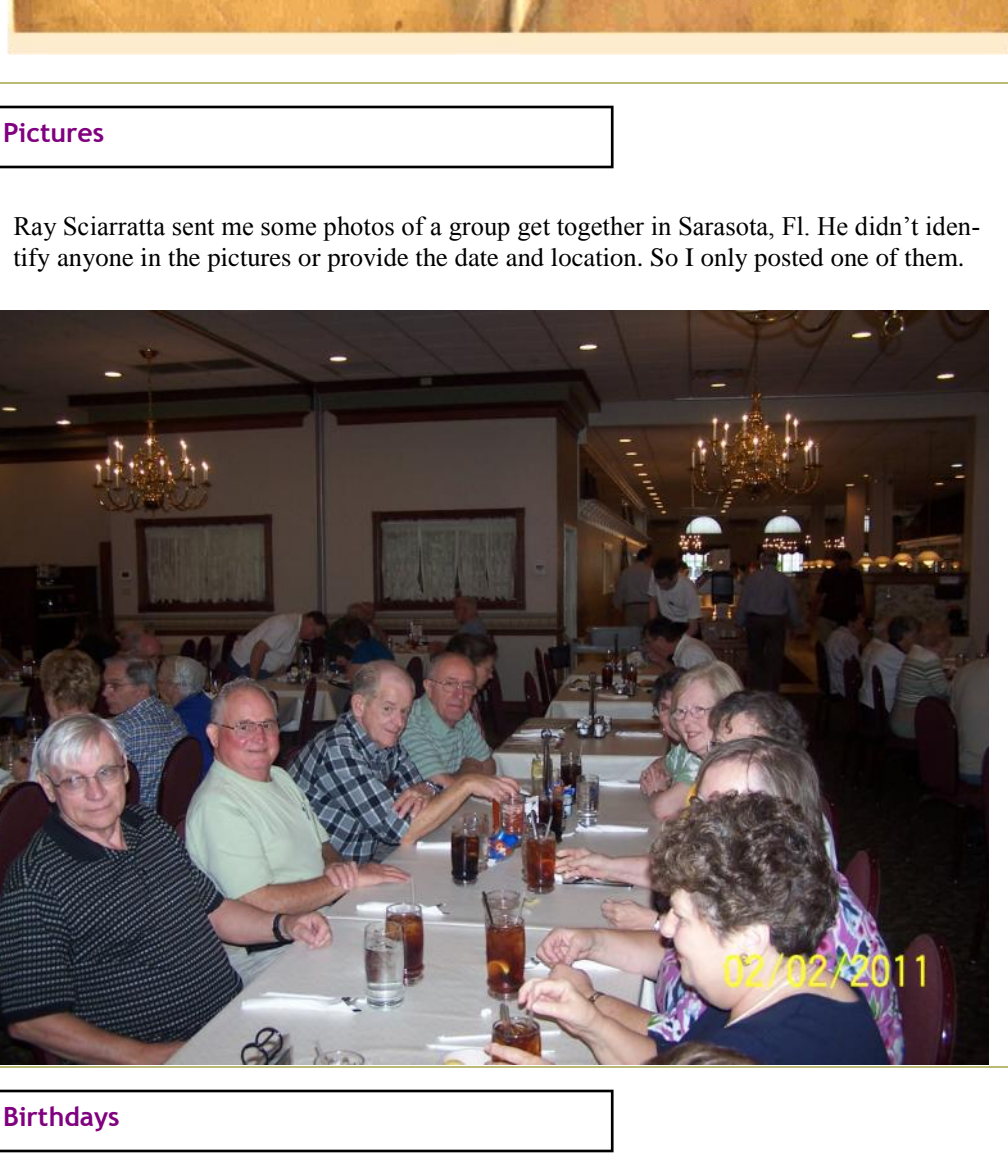


Cook Book

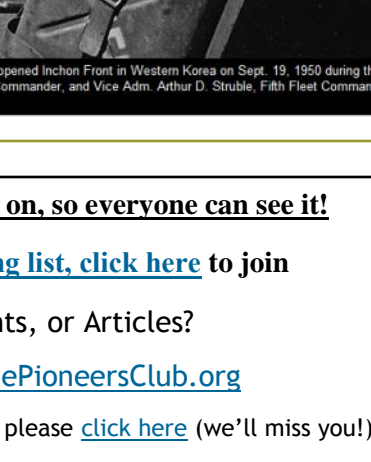
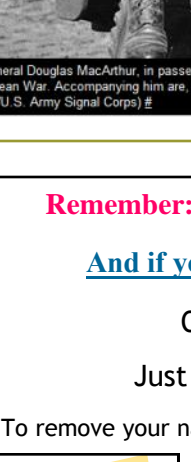

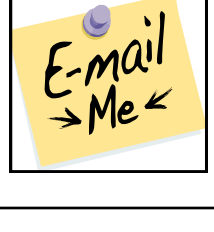
